SERIOUS ACCIDENT

A most distressing accident occurred Tuesday morning. Drexel Selman, son of Chas. Selman left home to work on a piece of grading near Card's ranch six miles south of town. He was driving a spirited horse, and while descending the hill below the flume the buggy ran on the horse, causing him to kick. The first blow must have stunned him so that he was unable to escape succeeding kicks, for when found he was at the bottom of the hill standing with the reins in his hand and his face battered so that he could hardly see. Jos. Bevans, on going to work on the Hicks threshing outfit, tied up Mr. Selman's horse and brought him home in his buggy. Dr. Keillor was summoned, and upon examination, he found the jaw broken in three places, a deep cut on the chin, a scar above the eye and the face so swollen that nothing could be done till the swelling had been removed.
